Our current labor contract with the college and Nassau County ends on August 31st, 2023. Negotiations for a new labor contract are scheduled to begin on May 9th. Because inflation, coupled with a stagnant economy, has depleted the purchasing power of your saved and soon-to-be-earned dollars, it is my belief that these negotiations must focus on monetary compensation.

It is official: TIAA Retirement Plan holders can now retire from their full-time faculty positions and continue to work as an adjunct at Nassau

Community College with certain conditions. Getting SUNY to change its position on this matter took many months. When I was approached by full-timers who were contemplating retirement but were very concerned that they would have to end their adjunct employment, I immediately went into a fact-finding mode and reached out to the individuals who could affect the needed changes. Ultimately, the effort was successful because of persistence and **not taking no for an answer** from General Counsel Donna Haugen and Associate Vice President of Human Resources Dorlena Dunbar.

If you are a TIAA Retirement Plan holder and are currently considering retiring from your full-time position and want to learn more about the process or have made the decision to retire, contact HR to get the information you require to start the retirement process. Please direct all related questions on this issue to your retirement plan's retirement counselors.

I am proud to announce that 14 AFA adjunct members have been nominated for the Chancellor Award For Excellence In Adjunct Teaching. On a date and time amenable to those applying for the award, I will hold a workshop that will make applying easier and increase the likelihood that the attending member adjuncts will win the award. 

The summer availability submission period opened on February 9th, and will be open through Thursday, March 23rd at 4:00 PM. Summer availability is slightly different than the other semesters. There are multiple sessions during the summer. One must complete availability for each session they choose to work. As you can see from the screenshot below, you must click the link for EACH summer session that you want to submit availability for BEFORE clicking the NEXT button. They are highlighted in different colors in the screenshot below (Orange, Yellow, Green and Blue). Highlighted in Pink is the *one box* to indicate that classroom faculty are available

for Distance Education; this one box indicates availability for *all summer sessions*. If you do not check this box, you will not be considered available for online teaching assignments.

Online summer courses run for varying lengths. Some run 5 weeks (Summer I *or* Summer II) while some run for 10 weeks (Summer I *and* Summer II). By checking the box that you are available for Distance Learning, you are indicating that you are available for 5-week *and* 10-week length courses.

If you make a mistake, or need to change your availability, once submitted, you need to void your submission. The process for this is to respond to your confirmation email indicating that you want to "VOID" your submission. You do not need to call IT or submit a ticket. If you do, you will be told to respond to that email. I tested the process and my submission was voided within 24 hours. That is not a guaranteed timeframe, though. If you are going to void your submission, you will need to resubmit your availability before **Thursday, March 23rd, at 4PM**. I recommend that you **don't void your submission** within 72 hours of that deadline.
